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A Message from the Superintendent

Dear OCSD Community Members:

We've had a good school year thus far in 2022–2023! Our Capital Project is underway with improvements in all of our school buildings. We've worked with our staff and community to support our students and found ways to secure additional resources, including a mental health grant that enables us to help connect families to community resources and for our district to offer additional social-emotional and mental health support to best serve our students' diverse needs. As we planned for the 23–24 school year budget, we continued to look at our resources and how we can offer the best programs and supports to our students.

The adopted 2023–2024 School Year Budget is \$53,246,946; this represents an increase of 7.69%. The tax levy increase is 3.0% and falls within the levy limit. The budget maintains all instructional and student support programming. Highlights of our programmatic plans for next school year include the following:

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A Message from the Superintendent

District-wide: For the 2023–24 School year, our pre-K–12 Academic Task Forces, under the guidance of Assistant Superintendent Dr. Tice, will continue the process of looking at research, content development, delivery of instruction and analysis of student learning. The Task Forces enable teachers pre-K–12 to collaborate and help promote consistency across grade levels and ensure that each grade level curriculum builds upon prior years' work and prepares our students for success with the next year's content. Our veteran teachers have helped establish a mentoring program for new staff in order to prepare them for success working with our students in our district. We are very fortunate to have such a committed cadre of teachers and administrators.

Elementary Schools: We will offer the Summer LEAP program to continue to address student needs in math, ELA, and social-emotional well-being. In addition, please look for information about our summer art and band camps. Our elementary teachers have been working diligently to support student learning in academic content and social-emotional skills.

The PRIDE program across all four buildings promotes Patience, Respect, Integrity, Determination and Excellence.

Middle School: Otto Shortell Middle School will be continuing the after-school Extended Instructional Program (EIP) and the Middle School Counts summer program. We are also very excited about, and will be continuing, our new Road to the Code program that enables our students to work with Vex Robotics and hone their coding skills. Additionally, we are looking forward to our first Civics Night where students will be showcasing their projects.

High School: Oneida High School will continue to focus on helping each student prepare for college and/or careers and civic readiness, including the addition of a graduation pathway titled "Seal of Civic Readiness." In addition to our strong academic programs, we are also proud to offer a broad array of experiences in the arts and athletics. This past year, we offered a course that enabled students to build their own electric guitars and then have the opportunity to hone their skills playing them. Our e-sports club has also been successful as our students compete with players across the country. We are very proud to have had a student qualify for the post-season tournament in our first year. Although we are renovating our auditorium, our band and choral programs have been able to continue with performances in other venues and our musical was a huge success. We are very proud of the talent of our students.

Capital Outlay Project: The Oneida City School District appropriates \$100,000 each year to address facility upgrades. These projects are eligible for building aid revenue return of approximately 88%. Our outlay project for the 2023–2024 School Year will include upgrading outdated mechanical controls in the boiler room and various classrooms to the new control system.

Oneida City School District continues to see a decline in enrollment. We have continued with our "attrition plan," which was put into motion in the 21–22 school year. This entails right-sizing section counts across grade levels, analyzing course loads and scheduling, and assessing the need to fill staff vacancies based on need. It is our intent to maintain the fiscal health of our district while continuing to offer a rich and well-rounded program for our students; meaningful professional development for our staff; and ensure safe and secure school environments and student transportation. This year, the district contracted with an outside consultant to study our enrollment, our facilities usage and to recommend a path forward for our district. We assembled the Community Advisory Committee and began meeting as a team in January 2023. This committee includes staff members and community members and works with our consultant to analyze data, ask questions and explore options for the future of our district. It is expected that the consultant will present the Board of Education with a recommendation for building utilization by December of 2023.

We would like to thank our community, staff and students for your ongoing support this year. I am confident that the budget we have proposed will continue the good work we strive for and the expectations you have as community members for our district.

Full Day Pre-K in Fall 2023

The Oneida City School District is proud to be able to offer full-day pre-K in the Fall of 2023! Pre-K for all students will be held at Willard Prior Elementary School. We are excited for the expanded educational opportunities that this shift will give to our students.

Registration is open for children residing in the Oneida City School District who have turned 4 years old on or before December 1, 2023 for Pre-K or 5 years old on or before December 1, 2023 for Kindergarten.



Students previously enrolled in the OCSD Pre-K program in the 2022-2023 school year will NOT need to re-register for kindergarten, but will need to submit an updated physical.

Registration is now open online. Pre-registration with FamilyID is the first step.

Once the online pre-registration is complete in FamilyID, parents will be contacted by the Registration Office to collect paperwork and finalize the registration process.



Required Paperwork to Complete Registration:

- Child's birth certificate.
- Proof of residency (current mortgage/lease or utility bill).
- Child's immunization record.
- Most recent physical examination form or proof of upcoming appointment. The physical must have been done within 12 months prior to entering school.
- Custody paperwork (if applicable).
- State required registration forms:

What You Will See On The Ballot

On Tuesday, May 16, 2023, voters will be asked to consider the following items:

Proposition #1: Budget

"Shall the Board of Education of the Oneida City School District, City of Oneida, County of Madison, New York, be herby authorized to expend the sum set forth in its proposed budget for the 2023-2024 school year in the amount of \$53,246,946 and to levy the necessary tax therefore?"

| Proposition #2: Buses

RESOLVED that, pursuant to Education Law §§2503(12-a) and 1709(25)(i), the Board of Education of the City School District of the City of Oneida, Madison County, New York, is hereby authorized to lease and expend therefore, including costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, an amount not to exceed the estimated cost of \$250,000, and for a term not to exceed five (5) years, the following motor vehicles: seven (7) seventy seat passenger school buses, and one (1) fifty-four seat passenger school bus with three wheel-chair positions,; AND, that such sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax collected in annual installments; and that in anticipation of such tax, obligations of the District shall be issued.

Board Seat Election

Two (2) open seats and will be voted on at this year's school district vote.



^{**} If the Board of Education were to adopt a contingency budget an additional amount of \$ 438,744 would need to be cut from the proposed budget in order to comply with NYS Education law section 2023 and chapter 97 of the Laws of 2011, of which \$27,744 must come from the administrative component of the budget.

^{1.} The basic school tax relief (STAR) exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.

Capital Outlay Project

State law provides that a district may receive building aid in the following school year for one project each year not to exceed \$100,000. These projects must be paid by budget appropriation (no borrowing) and require full voter authorization through passage of the annual budget. This year the Board of Education has decided to include a Capital Outlay Project to address temperature control upgrades at Oneida Senior High School. This project is eligible for 88% state aid reimbursement.



OHS Z Club Hosts Self-Defense Seminar



On February 16, the Oneida High School Z Club hosted a self-defense seminar for all interested students, staff and faculty members. The seminar was led by Rudy Duncan of Duncan's Martial Arts Academy, along with Corey Brown, a Canastota-based mar-

tial arts instructor.

While the seminar was specifically designed for women, the techniques learned are useful for anyone in a dangerous situation. Duncan's self-defense model is based on the three



A's: Awareness, Assessment and Action. Those that participated in the seminar learned some important skills, especially for our students, many of whom will be moving on to unfamiliar and new environments shortly.
